

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

**Dr. Virginia Saba Memorial Keynote Address** *Implementation Science and Practice: Implications for Nursing Informatics* 



Linda Roussel, PhD, RN, CNL, NEA-BC, FAAN, is a professor of nursing, DNP program director, and faculty mentor for doctoral students at the University of Alabama at Birmingham. Dr. Roussel's research publications include clinical nurse leadership, academic-clinical partnership, and front-line

engagement. She also recently received funding from the Health Resources and Services Administration to establish "Our Neighborhood Healthcare Clinic," a nurse-managed clinic providing care to vulnerable populations. A nurse with 30 years of experience ranging from clinical to executive roles, Dr. Roussel has served in leadership roles in acute, post-acute, long-term care, and transitional care management. Currently, she is president of the Alabama Organization of Nurse Executives and a member of the advisory council of the Alabama Department of Public Health, Office of Women's Health.

Jeff Tully, MD, is an anesthesiologist, pediatrician, and security researcher with an interest in understanding the ever-growing intersections between healthcare and technology. Prior to attending medical school, Dr. Tully worked on "hacking" the genetic code of salmonella bacteria to create anti-

cancer tools and throughout medical training has remained involved in the conversations and projects that will secure health care and protect patients in a new era of remote care, implantable medical devices, and biohacking.

Christian Dameff, MD, is an emergency physician, clinical informaticist, and researcher. His published clinical works include post-cardiac arrest care including therapeutic hypothermia, novel drug targets for acute myocardial infarction patients, ventricular fibrillation waveform

analysis, cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) quality and optimization, dispatch-assisted CPR, teletoxicology, clinical applications of wearables, and electronic health records. Dr. Dameff is also a hacker and security researcher interested in the intersection of health care, patient safety, and cybersecurity. He has spoken at some of the world's most prominent hacker forums and is a cofounder of the CyberMed Summit, a multidisciplinary conference on medical device and infrastructure cybersecurity. Dr. Dameff has published on cybersecurity topics, including hacking 911 systems, HL7 messaging vulnerabilities, and malware.

Do you want to get started in data analytics but are unsure where to begin? Is the statement SELECT \* FROM Patients; unfamiliar? If you answered "yes" to these questions, then this workshop is for you! Structured query language (SQL) is the language used to extract data from the databases in most health information systems today, including electronic health record systems. Designed for the individual who has no experience with databases or SQL, this hands-on workshop will help you to use DESCRIBE, SELECT, and WHERE to perform simple queries; describe the difference between \* and wildcard characters and correctly use them; use pattern matching with LIKE, NOT LIKE, and =; use Boolean operators AND, OR, and NOT; perform basic mathematical functions with SQL, such as averages and counts; and use JOIN to combine data from two tables. Users will be instructed by the presenter to install DB Browser for SQLite and be provided with a simple database with synthetic records. The presenter will explain concepts using didactic lectures and reinforce those concepts with hands—on activities.

**Workshop Requirements:** You must bring a Windows or Mac laptop. The software will not run on an iPad or Chromebook. You must be able to install software on your laptop from an internet site. If you are using a work–issued laptop, you must confirm with your IT department that you have permission to install DB Browser for SQLite and are able to copy a provided spreadsheet to your computer via download.
